Magistrates from multicultural communities bring an understanding of those communities' customs, values, ways of thinking and communicating, and relationships with authority. They understand being Eastern in a Western society. Asides from administering blind justice, such magistrates can deliver more insightful justice with glasses of cultural sensitivity.





Cultural diversity in any organisation is important and even more so in the Local Court bench as it shows the face of justice is the same kind of face as one would see in any other setting in society. Being from a culturally and linguistically diverse background affords me a deeper sense of empathy towards and understanding of the cultural challenges faced by many of the people who come before the court.
