Dear Attorney General,

Reporting on recommendations arising from an inquest into the death of 'BW'

I am writing to provide you with advice about actions the Department of Communities and Justice (**DCJ**) has taken in response to recommendations made following a Coronial Inquest into the tragic death of **BW** and his family are the subject of non-publication orders; he is to be referred to publicly as 'BW'.

On 8 September 2023 Deputy State Coroner Harriet Grahame made three recommendations to DCJ; one of which was directed solely to DCJ and the other two were joint recommendations for DCJ and the NSW Police Force. A further six recommendations were directed to the NSW Police Force.

As is required by Premiers Memorandum 2009-12, please find attached a table setting out actions taken by DCJ, and in collaboration with the NSW Police Force to complete the recommendations.
